Congratulations to all units and commissioners for doing their best this year toward continuous improvement in becoming the best BSA pack, troop, team, crew or ship that they can be! Much gratitude to Don Palomaki for collecting the forms and tracking our district progress.

2011 J2E – Remember, the 2011 Journey to Excellence program forms do not have to be filled out and signed. They are simple scoring sheets that should just be explained to the unit leader, and may be used as a guide during the unit's annual planning as well. I will send out a separate email just on JTE with resources and we will discuss in depth at this month's Commissioner Staff meeting (January 27th). MEMBERSHIP NOTES

Spring is right around the corner—come to Spring Roundup Training in February: It sure has been a cold winter, but don't let that fool you--Spring will be coming around the corner before you know it. We'll be providing your pack or troop Spring Roundup training at 7pm before the February Roundtable (2/10). What is Spring Roundup? Well, on June 1st all of those current Kindergartners whose parents asked about Cub Scouts at Back to School nights will be 1st graders in the eyes of the BSA. In addition, all of those current 5th graders will be 5th grade graduates and ready to join the Boy Scouts. We'll be providing your leaders insight on how to plan and execute an effective Spring Roundup of all those new Scouts for your unit.

Retention—Hold on to your Current Scouts: In our monthly notes to our fellow Scouters, the Membership Team mostly focuses on recruiting. Another key area for unit leadership membership focus is RETENTION. A small investment in outreach to Scouts and their families who have not attended activities over the last month can reap huge returns. Whether it is encouragement for Scouts who have fallen behind on their advancement, arrangement of rides for the family with a single mom, or just showing that your unit cares about its Scouts and families, a little goes a long way in retaining your Scouts.

Don't wait until they're irretrievably gone—invest just a few minutes to reach out to the Scouts and families that have not shown up for a couple of meetings. Make a call to the Scout who has not camped in the last three (3) months. And get feedback on how you can improve your unit program to keep your Scouts and families interested.

Help Wanted: Cub Scout Recruiting Coordinator: We continue to have a vacancy in the critical position of Cub Scout Recruiting Coordinator. This Scouter is responsible for training our pack leaders, supporting their recruiting efforts in the spring and fall, and tracking results to identify packs that may require assistance. Webelos to Scout: Send them off in Style, and Make Sure they Feel Welcome!: We have been emphasizing troop visits and support of Webelos as they make their choice of the troop to which they will bridge. Have you already worked with your leadership team and the PLC to have everything ready for your New Scout Patrol? Immediately getting your new Scouts into the troop routine will make them feel like they are members instead of newbies.



TO ALL UNITS—J2E

The Centennial Quality Unit Award (CQUA) Program has been replaced for 2011 by the Journey to Excellence (J2E) Program!

What is J2E? Journey to Excellence is the new performance assessment, communication and recognition program. It uses a balanced scorecard with three main elements: quality, growth and sustainability.

What does it provide for a unit? Many things, including: a framework for planning, a method for self-evaluation, specific guidelines and standards for what is considered good performance by a unit, recognition for good performance and much more.

How is performance measured? Although the measures are different for different types of units (packs, troops, crews/ships), the key areas measured are: advancement, outdoor, service, training, membership, retention, leadership and budget. There are specific measures with a point system, plus recognition of showing improvement.

What are the different levels of performance? Each unit can be Gold, Silver, Bronze or “did not meet minimum standard”.

Who does the assessment of the unit’s performance? As with the CQUA program, the unit leadership and commissioner jointly evaluate the unit’s performance against the standards.

When does this assessment take place? Also as with the CQUA program, the evaluation takes place at the end of the year (Nov/Dec) as part of the unit charter renewal process.

How is the unit recognized for Gold, Silver or Bronze performance? With a ribbon, plaque, uniform patches, and clip art for the unit web page.

Does a commitment form have to be filled out at the end of the year for the coming year (as was the case for CQUA)? No. There is a form for each type of unit that lays out the criteria and point system, but it does not have to be filled out and signed. However, all units should go over the forms, criteria and point system with their unit commissioner.

How do you find out more? See your unit commissioner, and there are also Journey to Excellence resources online and information via webinars that will be offered in January and February 2011. See below:

NOW MANDATORY! TOUR PERMIT PROCEDURES CHANGE

It is recommended that all units appoint one adult leader or committee member to serve as their Tour Permit Coordinator. The job of this coordinator is to set up a "My Scouting" account for the unit's *Local and National Tour Permit* needs. Both types of tour permits can be completed and submitted electronically (ONLINE); once submitted, they are processed and returned to the preparer via email. This now eliminates mailing costs and delays. As of JANUARY 1st, "Paper" tour permits WILL NO LONGER BE ACCEPTED!

Local Tour Permits: Local tour permits are required for any day activity where a unit is traveling more than 50 miles (but less than 500) UNLESS they are traveling on an overnight activity, aquatics activity, high adventure activity OR TO AN OUT-OF-COUNCIL SUMMER CAMP.

Overnight activities, aquatics activities, high adventure trips AND all out-of-council camp attendance require a tour permit. Cub Scout packs and dens do not have to file a tour permit for 'Go See It' activities.

needed to earn the monetary rewards. When your unit's **combined** giving levels reach bronze level the BUDDY will receive a \$50.00 credit, silver level earns \$75.00 and at gold the amount is \$100.00!! We feel very strongly that those who are willing to put the extra time in to help the ODD succeed in the campaign should be rewarded. NCAC is again supporting our program completely. We are going to set record breaking giving levels for council again this year. Those that help us achieve this goal will be earning a well deserved thank you gift in return!!

We need MORE BUDDIES, please assist. This is a great way in get involved at the grass roots level and it clearly makes a difference.

WHAT IS FRIENDS OF SCOUTING(FOS)?

Once a year, we ask the parents of our scouts and other key volunteers to please consider donating to the family friends of scouting campaign (fos). These donations are used to fund our council operations and programs for boys and girls. Currently it costs council approximately \$185 per scout, annually, to provide the programs, literature and advancement administration and camping opportunities for the Washington metro area.

A boy scout council is a non profit organization! It gets virtually all of its operating funds via donations from members, parents and benefactors. it cannot continue to operate without the members contributions. the only money received from national BSA headquarters is 20% of the sales from the local council's scout shop.

Scouting helps build strong character, values, communities and families. During these difficult economic times, now more than ever, it is important that we support the scouting organization so these Core values can continue to be passed on and made available for the formation of our childrens' character throughout our community.

OLD DOMINION 2011 SPRING CAMPOREE

The ODD 2011 Spring Camporee will be held in Harper's Ferry, WV April 29-May 1. The Old Dominion District will set up camp at the Harpers Ferry KOA just half a mile from the National Park visitor center. Scouts will get a chance to visit the town, explore the National Park and get to know the history of the era and area. The program will likely include a Patrol Challenge covering several events in the morning (for those who want to do that, and for the rest of the day (or all day, if they choose) there are several different hikes including an Historical Trail Hike for which you can buy a patch.

There will be a program for Venture age Scouts which may include all day activities such as white water rafting, C&O Canal Bike Trip, Appalachian Trail Hike, Rock Climbing, black powder shooting, fishing and a history scavenger hunt.

Reenactors have accepted an invitation to join us and will be available for Scouts and leaders to visit throughout the Camporee. We will also offer Scouts an opportunity to spend a couple of hours time either in the morning or afternoon with these living history soldiers and experience the "Camp of Instruction", a taste of Civil War era boot camp.

SCOUT SUNDAY AND SCOUT SABBATH PLANNING

A Scout is Reverent is one of the tenants of the Scout law. For the year 2011, Scout Sunday falls on the 6th and Scout Sabbath is on the 12th of February. Most denominations plan their services several months in advance. Units that plan to participate in services as a unit should appoint a committee person and a Scout this month to begin working with the church leadership to set up the Scout unit's participation in one of the services during the month of February. However, it is not required that your unit participate on the dates specified by the Council. Many church leaders prefer to have the Scouts participate in an appropriate liturgy, so let the church leaders make the final call on that issue.

For those units sponsored by a religious group, your physical presence once a year can pay great dividends in terms of continued support by that organization. Most religious organizations like Scouting and considerate it a key element of their youth program. A Scout Sunday or Sabbath is a great way to show your gratitude for what they have done.

Church leaders are sensitive to the fact that on a Scout Sunday or Sabbath there may be Scouts and parents present that are not members of their specific faith or denomination. I've seen them do a great job in making everyone feel welcome. These Scout religious events are an important part of your program.

Youth Protection Training On-line

Youth Protection Training is available online and provides adult volunteers with an understanding about child abuse and the youth protection policies of the Boy Scouts of America. This course is appropriate for every adult working with youth and may be mandatory to work at or participate in certain Council or National sponsored events. Re-certification is mandatory at least once every two years. Sessions can be scheduled for units or other groups upon request. Note that there is a different class for Venturing leaders, also available on-line, which addresses special considerations for older age youth, and coed units.

Setting-up an on-line training account in you name is a one-time process and requires your BSA registration number, found on your registration card.

This is Scouting On-line

This is Scouting is available online, here is where it all begins. Under the BSA training program "This is Scouting" is the entry-level course required for all Scout leader training. It is the foundation for building award winning "Quality Units". This fast paced course gives new leaders an overview of the entire Scout program. It covers: the purposes, aims and methods of Scouting; organization and structure of Scouting units; program funding; safe Scouting; and, the appropriate teaching methods for all ages and stages of youth and young adults. You do not need to repeat the class as you take additional leader specific training for new scouting positions you may move into This course is available online at <http://www.ole.scouting.org>.

Troop Committee Challenge On-line

Troop Committee Challenge is available online and provides training for the Troop Committee Chairman and Committee Members. We will continue to offer this class in a classroom setting as long as there is demand for it. While the online version covers the key teaching points and is available according to your personal schedule, the classroom version has the advantage that it provides the opportunity for Qs and As with the instructor and interaction with other in the class in the same position. Special Incentive and Opportunity to put your Troop's or Crew's claim in the Klondike!



The ILSC consists of three 90 minute modules to be conducted by crew advisor and crew president to teach leadership skills to the entire crew: Unit Organization, The Team Based Crew, Crew Organization and Jobs, Servant Leadership, Introduction of Vision, Communications, Planning, Teaching EDGE, Teams and Team Characteristics, Stages of Team Development and Styles of Leadership, Inclusion. Leadership Ethics and Values, and Vision. All modules can be presented on a Friday night-Saturday or Saturday scenario or as individual modules or module segments in

Venturing meetings. Varsity Introduction to Leadership Skills. Introduction to Leadership Skills for Varsity Teams will be out in 4 months but will teach the same leadership skills the ILS for Crews. Varsity Teams can start using the ILSC and use the Varsity Team organization and job descriptions out of the Varsity Guidebook for the organization part of the Introduction to Leadership Skills course.

Now Available Online – Varsity Fast Start in E-Learning and Varsity Coach Leader Specific Training Syllabus. Varsity Fast Start has now been moved to E-Learning in “My Scouting” so that when you take it, you automatically get training credit on our scoutnet adult training records. Also the Varsity Coach Leader Specific Training syllabus and powerpoints are online so you can read ahead for VCLST training. You can find them at scouting.org > Volunteer > Training > Varsity Specific Training.

Venturing Out Adventures at the Old Dominion Spring Camporee, April 29-30 and May 1, 2011. The Old Dominion District Camporee will be at Harper’s Ferry. There will be Venturing Out adventures for Venturers, Varsity Scouts, and Sea Scouts. Mark you calendar and watch for more details on the fun.

Venturing Summit 2011, April 8-10, 2011. Venturers and Varsity Scouts are invited to attend the Northeast Region Area 6 Venturing Summit 2011 at Camp Rodney (north end of Chesapeake Bay), April 8-10, 2011. The following is provided by the youth leadership team planning the Venturing Summit. “April 2011’s Venturing Summit will be an Ancient Greek/Roman Festival. Upon arrival Friday night, crews and individuals will be asked to sign up for their weekend activities in our headquarters area. At that time you will receive T-shirts and patches for your group as well as a pocket guide to the program. This is a small, bound book that will be provided to each participant and staff member, including a detailed description of each activity, the master schedule, a map of the camp and house room to tally your group’s score in our Olympic competition! You will then be escorted to your pre-arranged cabin/tenting area by a member of our staff. Friday night activities include a casual, social, ice-breaking evening with cupcake/cookie decorating, flash-light tag & group stargazing.

Differing slightly from previous years, we’ve decided to appeal more to the broad interests of Venturers and heavily incorporate both advancement-related and purely fun activities. This will occur through a system of flexible

'tracks'. A participant is not required, nor encouraged, to choose a 'track', but to incorporate programs from both areas into their weekend. This system exists primarily for organizational purposes, so that we can better fit a wealth of activities into the weekend and avoid any problems with scheduling similar activities at identical times.

The **Gladiator Track** will include programs such as: flashlight tag, discuss, javelin, shotgun, rifle shooting and archery. The Olympic competition is to be held all day Saturday, and will include various challenges as well as points for the activities listed here. By Saturday evening, the winning team or crew will be chosen and the winners will enjoy their prize at the festival that night. In addition, we will provide a velcrow wall, climbing wall, and are looking into sailing small groups - launched into the Chesapeake right off the beaches of camp! Your weekend will also include fly fishing, gladiator training (karate), a morning run around camp and much much more than even the oracles could tell you.

The **Senator Track** will include programs such as: stargazing, astronomy & sign language classes, a tie-dye your toga station, possible sandal making, basket weaving and the like. These areas will be made to incorporate all that we can from requirements of the bronze and gold awards.

Participants and staff alike are encouraged to dress up for the entirety of the event (bring a sheet to tie-dye!) and a costume contest will be held at Saturday night's festival! This dance will be held in a building of camp and include a professional DJ, food, plenty of music and fun! Sunday will finish off the weekend with breakfast, the wrapping up of activities and a group clean-up of camp.

Change in Kodiak Leadership Training Course. Kodiak is a youth leadership development course that is presented as part of an outdoor high adventure program – six days or two three-day weekends. It is based on the servant leader concept and will now teach seven leadership skills (instead of the former 5 commissions) using illustrations found in nature – vision, planning, team development, communications, inclusiveness, values, and servant leadership. Kodiak can be used by Venturing Crews, Sea Scout Ships, Varsity Teams, and Scout Troops. Watch for more information on when the new syllabus will be available this spring. Unit leaders do have to apply to NCAC Youth Leader Development Training to use the course on their high adventures.
